Cars are big-ticket items, and consumers need to know that their money is well spent.

For most people, buying a used car comes with a fair amount of risk. There's a reason why car manufacturers rarely offer warranties beyond three years — a car's complexity means that regardless of manufacturing quality, or care taken by the driver, things can and will go wrong after a while. How wrong they'll go is the question. Many drivers find their cars last for years, with only minor repairs required, while others face huge bills after catastrophic mechanic or electrical failure, even when all signs pointed to the cars being reliable.

1. AVOID BUYING A CAR PRIVATELY

Unless you're a mechanic with the skills to inspect (and repair) cars, it's wise to avoid buying your used car from a private seller. While most private sellers aren't trying to rip you off, it's simply that they are not Registered Motor Vehicle Traders (RMVT). This means you have very few legal protections.

Buy privately, and you have no recourse if you discover you were misled. In short, the risk is entirely yours.

2. LOOK FOR A RMVT



When you buy a used car from a Registered Motor Vehicle Trader, you're protected under the Consumer Guarantees Act. These laws are there to minimise your risk. That means you can have confidence you're being told the truth about the car you're buying. If the car isn't performing the way you expected, you can take it back to the seller to be fixed or to get a refund.

3. LOOK FOR DEALERS WHO LOWER THE RISK EVEN MORE

In the new era of online car buying some dealers go the extra mile to reduce risk. At Autoport, for example, their structure means they're essentially a go-between - they're not trying to sell you any particular car like a traditional car dealer has to. Rather they offer a vast platform which minimises risk to users. That includes all the protections you'd usually expect from an RMVT and you know Autoport cars have all passed AA Safety Compliance standards.

4. 5 DAY TEST DRIVE

All used-car sellers will let you test drive a car before buying, but a 15 minute drive isn't the test you might think it is.
